# **Thousands Rally After Ferguson Decision**

Thousands of people rallied late Monday in U.S. cities including Los Angeles and New York to passionately but peacefully protest a grand jury's decision not to indict a white police officer who killed a black 18-year-old in Ferguson, Missouri.

They led marches, waved signs and shouted chants of "hands up, don't shoot," the refrain that has become a rallying cry in protests over police killings across the country.

The most disruptive demonstrations were in St. Louis and Oakland, California, where protesters flooded the lanes of freeways, milling about stopped cars with their hands raised in the air.

#### Are We Being Watched?

It is no longer a secret that the government is spying on its citizens. It has publicly notified its citizens that they are being spied on. But do you know how this is done?

A newly developed surveillance system has been built into airplanes to disguise themselves as cell phone towers. 'When you turn on your cell phone, it immediately puts out a call to find the nearest cell phone tower.

Ordinarily, it will connect with a cell phone owned by your service provider, but the Department of Justice has a fleet of airplanes outfitted with special hardware that can trick phones into connecting to the airplane instead of a conventional cell phone tower. Because each cell phone has a unique identifier, this registration process can help the federal investigators determine who owns the phone and track a suspect as he moves from location to location.'



Although the device is intended to monitor criminal and terrorist suspects, it also scans through other people's personal data.

"I don't like it. Yet, I've always been aware that they are doing it more and more," said Diona Christine. "If they are using it to track criminals and terrorists then it may be a good thing. However, innocent citizens get caught in the search when their privacy is invaded," she added.

"The government has to go through many records and transcripts of innocent people in order to find out who the criminals are. So I am at risk of being spied on as a result," said Christine

"I believe that normal freedom and basic human rights are at high risk as security measures are increasing and tightening in the name of terrorism," said Denise Witherspoon of Washington, D.C. "We are not far away from living in a militant world where martial law will be everything." ###

### Thanksgiving in America

Thanksgiving was the first American holiday. On October 14, 1789, a proclamation was issued by George Washington. It was published in the Massachusetts Centinel, which stated it would be "A Day of Publick Thanksgiving and Prayer."

The first American settlers experienced hardship; not knowing what would grow or when or if it would grow. They had to rely on hunting and fishing while experiencing a very, very, cold, brutal winter.

Facing near death, they were saved by Native Americans who taught them what would grow, when it would grow, and how to store it properly for the long winters ahead.

The colonists of the Plymouth Plantation held a celebration of food and feasting, according to Archiving Early Americans. Indian Chiefs Massassoit, Squanto and Samoset, and ninety of their men joined in the event.

In 1637, Indians were attacked by German and Dutch mercenaries, according to University of Connecticut Anthropology Department Chairman William B. Newell. The Native Americans were either shot or burned


The next day the Governor of Bay Colony, Massachusetts ordered a day of Thanksgiving, thanking God the battle had been won.
